



To the Citizens of Gilberts:

I am pleased to present the Popular Annual Financial Report (PAFR) for Fiscal Year 2017 for the Village of Gilberts. I would like to note that both the PAFR for FY 2016 and the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) for FY 2016 were granted awards for financial reporting by the Government Finance Officers Association.

Each year the Village of Gilberts publishes a Comprehensive Annual Financial Report which contains a review of Village finances presented in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles. These accounting guidelines are set by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board.

These principles and standards are intended to provide all reporting governmental entities with a consistent and uniform financial reporting standard. Unfortunately, many of the Generally Accepted Accounting Principles requirements result in dense technical financial documents which do not convey much in the way of information to the average non-financial person.

As part of the Village of Gilberts effort to manage a transparent government, the Village publishes the annual Popular Annual Financial Report which provides a less technical over-view of Village finances. A HISTORY OF GILBERTS

The Village of Gilberts began in the spring of 1836 when E.R. Starks and Elijah Rich filed claims to what would be Rutland Township, which they named after the Vermont City that had been their home before moving to the Illinois frontier. In 1839, Albro Gilberts arrived and established a farm in what is now the center of Gilberts. As farming became a dominant local occupation, several businesses opened to serve the farmers, citizens formed local chapters of the Patrons of Husbandry, and the "Grange" became an important part of the social and political life of the area.

Around 1852, a post office established near the railroad station, was named Gilberts Station, a name which generalized to the surrounding community. A key factor in the growth of the Gilberts area was its proximity to the Galena and Chicago Union Railroad, now the Union Pacific Railroad, which became a central transportation point shipping large amounts of rail freight which consisted primarily of milk collected from local farmers.

By 1875, Gilberts was a thriving community with a train station, two blacksmith shops, a steam feed mill, two grocery stores, live stock

sales barns, a wagon shop, a drug store, a lumber store, several saloons, a dance hall, a local jail, two milk processing companies, and an elementary school. In 1890 Gilberts incorporated as a village and 2015 marked the 125th anniversary of Gilberts incorporation.

In 1956, the construction of the Chicago-Northwest Tollway resulted in new industrial development in Gilberts. A light industrial manufacturing area was established in the 1960's which grew with the development of three additional industrial parks in the 1970's. In 1988, a new water system was constructed which supported new residential development. Beginning in 2013 and finished in 2014, the Illinois Tollway Authority built a complete interchange at Route 47. This interchange provides greater interstate access to the Chicago metro area while preserving the identity and character of the quaint rural living environment that drew the early settlers to the area.

In 2014, a bankrupt housing development on the Villages north side was resurrected. The Conservancy currently has two model homes open and is actively selling first of 997 new homes in the subdivision.

VILLAGE SERVICES

The Village provides a full range of services. Gilberts' public safety activities include police protection and a neighborhood watch program. Public works provides street and right-of-way maintenance and repair, as well as building maintenance, and park maintenance. Water service includes a treatment plant, sanitary sewer service and a sanitation treatment plant. These functions are included in the Water and Sewer enterprise fund.

Community Events

The Village sponsors and assists with various community events within the Village's departmental program budgets. These include the annual Easter Egg Hunt, annual Halloween Bonfire, summer long Movies in the Park, and Community Days, a three day Friday through Sunday annual celebration held the first weekend after the Memorial Day weekend.



Fiscal Management

Annually the Village adopts a budget that defines its legal spending authority. Departments submit requests to the Village Administrator so that a budget may be prepared. The requested budget document is prepared by fund, function, and activity. The budget is presented to the Village Board for review. The Village Board holds a public hearing and adjusts the requested budgeted amounts to reflect anticipated operations and capital spending for the delivery of services offered by the Village. The Village's budget is adopted no later than April 30th, the close of the preceding fiscal year.

Economic Condition and Outlook

The Village continues to maintain a tenuous financial position with slow revenue growth. This trend has been evident over the last several years and results mainly from the increased emphasis on infrastructure improvements, slow residential growth, and the lack of new revenue sources.

During the current year the Village had slight increases in property taxes and increases in Intergovernmental revenues. Telecommunication revenue again declined slightly with the decrease in residential land lines. Actual General Fund revenues exceeded final adjusted budget due to a slight increase in building related revenues.

Network Gilberts

Network Gilberts is an economic development initiative to encourage the expansion of existing businesses while developing opportunities and gigabit internet infrastructure for commercial, office research, and light industrial development in the Village. Building on this initiative, the Village is moving its municipal network to a secure fiber optic based network. This will enhance communication in Public Works, Police Department and Village Hall. Elements of the water system are also connecting to the network for SCADA management.



NOTABLE ACHIEVEMENTS IN FY 2017

Electronic Communication

The Village created an electronic newsletter and initiated an email update service for communicating events and notices to residents. Subscription to the service has been good and continues to grow. The Village continues to use Face book for notifications and news with excellent results. Government documents and notifications are also posted on the Village website. Each department has a section of the website. The Finance Department posts and maintains copies of all annual financial reports on their website page.

New Development - The Conservancy

The Village has been working with a new developer to build a 997 residential development, The Conservancy. Phase one of the development consisting of 123 single family lots is almost completely sold. Infrastructure work has commenced on developing the next neighborhoods along with planning for park space. The developer is working with the Village to expand the municipal water supply to accommodate the additional homes.

Water Plant Expansion

Due to the Conservancy development, the developer has an obligation to fund an expansion of the existing municipal water supply to accommodate the additional homes. The Village is in the process of adding two new wells and expanding the existing water plant capacity by one million gallons daily. Part of this project will also evaluate the existing plant to identify efficiency upgrades to be constructed concurrent with the expansion.

Wide Open West (WOW)

As part of a continuing economic development initiative, WOW initiated construction of a fiber based network to provide business class internet service to underserved areas in the Old Town business area as well as the existing industrial district.

Comcast

As part of a continuing economic development initiative, Comcast entered the Gilberts market offering a range of services to the business community in the industrial district.

Town Center Park Improvements

The development of amenities in Town Center Park continued this year. To supplement the open fields for soccer, playground, splash park, and pony softball field, a pavilion with picnic tables and a drinking fountain were installed. To build upon this, efficiency improvements were made to the splash park feature.

Prairie Business Park

Commercial development continues with construction of a new Shell gas station and Dunkin Donuts a to open late in 2017. The appliance manufacturer Sub Zero established a warehouse and distribution center during the past year in the Prairie Business park. This leaves only one lot left until build out is complete.

VILLAGE OVERVIEW

Village Government

The Village of Gilberts is governed by a Village President and Board of Trustees. The Village's policies are set by the Village President and the Village Board. The Village Administrator is responsible for implementing the policies and directives of the Village President and the Village Board.

Village Demographics

The Village of Gilberts with an area of 5.5 square miles, has a current population of 7,556 living in nine subdivisions with a total of 2,441 residential dwelling units with an average population of 3.29 per household. The median household income level is \$105,379, home ownership is 92.8% and 48% percent of persons age 25+ hold a Bachelors or higher degree. (US Census data) .

Safe City Notice

Website Safewise found Gilberts to be one of the top 50 safest cities in Illinois. Safewise reviewed the 2015 FBI Crime Report statistics and population data, eliminated all cities with fewer than 5,000 residents, and any cities that failed to submit a complete crime report to the FBI. Gilberts is the first of five communities in Kane County that made the list. Some 28.1% of the town's population are 14 years of age or younger, nearly 10 percentage points greater than the state share of children of 19.4%. Gilberts has an extremely low crime rate of 25.7 incidences per 100,000 residents, far lower than the state rate of 436.3 crimes per every 100,000 residents.

Construction

The Village projects issuing 114 new home permits with a value of \$11,658,466.00 Permits issued for all non new home construction in the Village totaled 403. These permits are remodeling and or improvements to existing structures. The Village anticipates CalAtlantic will complete their townhouse construction in 2017, complete their required infrastructure upgrades, and turn those upgrades over to the Village. The Conservancy is approaching 123 homes built of the almost 997 planned. Infrastructure work has started on the next neighborhood adjacent to the present construction. Anticipated by spring 2018 is a neighborhood of age-targeted to homebuyers over 55 years old seeking a ranch-home maintenance-included community.

The top 15 Principal Property Tax Payers in Gilberts

Have a combined Taxable Asset Value of \$8,769,717 which is 5.16% of Total Village Taxable Assessed Value. The total assessed value of property in the Village is \$169,844,554.00

Business

There are 144 locations of business activity within the village, most clustered in the central industrial/business district. The top ten businesses in Gilberts employ a total of 947 which represents 23.66% of the total village workforce. Of these businesses, fifteen are single location and three are a branch of a larger corporation. Within the past two years a variety of new industrial activity has moved into the Village including military/industrial fasteners, trade show booth design and corporate offices for construction recycling.

REPORT OVERVIEW

Report Overview

This financial report is designed to provide a general overview of the Village of Gilberts' finances for all those with an interest in the government's finances. Information contained in the Popular Annual Financial Report is based on data sourced from the Village of Gilberts' Comprehensive Annual Financial Report.

Each year the Village of Gilberts publishes the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) which is a technical document that summarizes village finances according to Generally Accepted Accounting Principles. The CAFR contains an independent auditors report which indicates the financial data has been reviewed and with reasonable assurance the data is complete, presented accurately and formatted correctly.

Village management continues to revise processes, implement internal controls, and establish new financial policies to provide reasonable controls to prepare financial statements that are free of any material misstatements. Management asserts that, to the best of our knowledge and belief, this financial report is complete and reliable in all material respects.

This Popular Annual Financial Report has been prepared to provide a summary overview of the CAFR in a format that is readable and available on the village website. These documents (current and historical) are available on the web at www.villageofgilberts.com

FUND ACCOUNTING

Fund Financial Statements

The Village of Gilberts operates on a modified accrual basis, a form of accounting in which expenditures are recognized when goods and services are received, and revenues such as taxes are recognized when measurable and available to pay expenditures in the current accounting period. A fund is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The Village of Gilberts, like other local governments, uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with best practice and finance-related legal requirements. All of the funds of the Village of Gilberts can be divided into three categories: governmental funds, proprietary funds, and fiduciary funds.

Governmental Funds

Governmental funds are used to account for essentially the same functions reported as governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. However, governmental fund financial statements focus on near-term inflows and outflows of spendable resources, as well as on balances of spendable resources available at the end of the fiscal year. Such information may be useful in evaluating the Village of Gilberts' near-term financing requirements and readers may better understand the long-term impact of the government's near-term financing decisions. The Village of Gilberts maintains six individual governmental funds. Information is presented separately in the governmental funds balance sheet and in the governmental funds statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances for the General Fund which are considered major funds.

Data from the other four governmental funds are combined into a single, aggregated presentation. Individual fund data for each of these non-major governmental funds is provided in the form of combining statements elsewhere in this report. The Village of Gilberts adopts an annual appropriated budget for the General Fund. The Village also prepares a working budget to monitor day-to-day operations.

Proprietary Funds

The Village of Gilberts maintains only one proprietary fund, an enterprise fund. Enterprise funds are used to report the functions presented as business-type activities in the government-wide financial statements. The Village of Gilberts utilizes an enterprise fund to account for its water and solid waste utility operations. The proprietary fund financial statements provide financial information for the Utility.

Fiduciary Funds

Fiduciary funds are used to report assets held in a trustee or agency capacity for others and therefore are not available to support Village programs. The reporting focus is on net assets and changes in net assets and is reported using accounting principles similar to proprietary funds. Pension trust funds are used to account for assets held in a trustee capacity for pension benefit payments.

Pension Funds

The village contributes to two defined benefit pension plans, the Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund (IMRF), a defined benefit agent multiple-employer public employee retirement system; and the Police Pension Plan that is a single-employer pension plan. Separate, audited GAAP-basis financial statements for the Police Pension Plan can be obtained by writing the Village at 87 Galligan Road, Gilberts, Illinois 60136. IMRF does issue a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for the plan as a whole, but not by individual employer. That report may be obtained on-line at www.imrf.org. The benefit, benefit levels, employee contributions, and employer contributions are governed by Illinois Compiled Statutes and can only be amended by the Illinois General Assembly.

THE FUNCTIONS OF THE BUDGET

Budgets help manage government through a financial plan that balances revenues with expenditures and limiting the amount of money each department may spend.

Budgets perform social and political functions by giving interest groups a forum to express their needs and providing government an opportunity to choose whether to fund those needs. Budgets raise the social conscience of a community by making inequities more visible and exposing a government's commitment to fairness. Budgets are political spending decisions which both shape and are shaped by the values of the community. Thus the budget becomes a contract for the provision of services between the government and those it serves.

Budgeting involves converting data and information on community needs and wishes into an action plan with resources. Economically the budget process converts the factors of production (labor and capital) into goods and services. The process of preparing a budget is about discovering the linkages between inputs and outcomes.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS FY 2017

Interstate Partners: Beginning in 2012, Interstate Partners began construction of a \$67M industrial/retail development. This is a phased multi-year project, which has now completed its third of four buildings. To help facilitate this project the Village approved our second tax increment financing district to assist with infrastructure costs. Two buildings are occupied, a third building of 300K sq. ft. is completed and a fourth building is in the development phase.

The Conservancy: The Conservancy is a Neumann Homes development that entered bankruptcy November 1, 2007. In 2013, a new development company began working with the Village to resurrect this development. Model homes are now open and sales of homes have begun.

Fosiva: The developer of the Conservancy created Fosiva, a fiber optic based network developed to bring added value to the Conservancy homes through the use of a gigabit connection to the internet.

Social Media: The Village implemented an increased social media presence focusing on Facebook and posting on the Village website. An electronic notification initiative was implemented using an electronic newsletter and push notifications to residents who sign up for the free service.

VILLAGE SERVICE HIGHLIGHTS FY 2017

The Village provides a full range of services. Gilberts' public safety activities include police protection and a neighborhood watch program. Public works provides street and right-of-way maintenance and repair, as well as building maintenance, and park maintenance. Water service including a treatment plant, sanitary sewer service and a sanitation treatment plant are functions which are included in the Water and Sewer enterprise fund. Town Center Park features a new playground, ball field, field house with bathrooms and a splash park open May through September.

The Village also assists with various community events, which are blended into the Village's departmental program budgets. These include the annual Easter Egg Hunt, a Halloween Bonfire, the three day Community Days celebration, and the summer series Movies in the Park.

FISCAL ANALYSIS—REVENUES 2017 WHERE THE MONEY COMES FROM

The government-wide financial analysis provides readers with a broad overview of the Village of Gilberts' finances, in a manner similar to a private-sector business. Government-wide financial statements distinguish functions of the Village of Gilberts that are principally supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues (governmental activities) from other functions that are intended to recover all or a significant portion of their costs through user fees and charges (business-type activities). The governmental activities of the Village of Gilberts include general government, public safety, public works, and parks and recreation. The business-type activities of the Village of Gilberts include waterworks and sewage operations.

Economic Condition and Outlook

The Village continues to maintain a tenuous financial position with slow revenue growth. This trend has been evident over the last several years and results mainly from the increased emphasis on infrastructure improvements, slow residential growth, and the lack of new revenue sources. During the current year the Village had slight increases in property taxes and increases in Intergovernmental revenues. Telecommunication revenue again declined slightly with the decrease in residential land lines. Actual General Fund revenues exceeded final adjusted budget due to a slight increase in building related revenues.

Intergovernmental: Sources in this category include state income tax, replacement tax, sales tax and use tax. Intergovernmental revenues increased from FY 16 to FY 17 which are attributed to an improving economy.

Property Taxes: Sources in this category include general property taxes along with road and bridge. Property tax increased by 4.3% . This increase is attributed to an improving economy.

Other

Revenue in this category comes from investment income. A prudent investment strategy can yield significant revenue. All money not immediately needed must be invested within two working days in an interest-bearing account. Municipalities are authorized to combine cash balances from more than one fund for investment. However, money combined for such purposes must still be accounted for separately, with earnings apportioned to the appropriate fund. The increase in this category relates to the \$480,000 received from the developer of the Conservancy property to purchase tax certificates in FY 15.

Charges for Services

Sources in this category include, but are not limited to licenses, permit and fees, (Building permits, liquor license) fines and forfeitures (fines-Court, Police Enhanced DUI, Drug Forfeitures) and Charges for Services (franchise fees, impact fees, refuse removal services, water services, and water tower antenna rental space). Charges for services increased by 4.9% This small increase is attributed to new industrial development in the Village.

Operating Grants

Sources in this category include motor fuel tax (MFT) granted to the Village. The State of Illinois imposes a tax on each gallon of gasoline sold at retail. Local governments receive a portion of the collections which is calculated based upon population. Operating Grants increased by 150.44% due to the \$350,000 received for the repair of the Hennessey Court culvert.

Revenue By Source

Revenue increased from FY 16 to FY17 in the amount of \$553,488.00 This increase is due to increases seen in Intergovernmental revenue, property tax revenue, and a slight increase in charges for services.


Utility Taxes

Sources in this category include taxes on communications, gas and utilities. Utility Taxes declined by \$42,127.00 This is attributable to the decrease in telecommunication utilities and cable franchise fees. Revenues for governmental activities this year were \$5,412,687. This shows slight increases in intergovernmental revenues was the receipt acceptance of a one time depreciable capital asset subdivision infrastructure. The following graphs depict the Total Revenue and the Total Expenses of all governmental activities for FY 16 and FY 17. Total Revenue and Total Expense (following page) graphically depict the major revenues and expense categories of the Village of Gilberts. The graph depicts very clearly the reliance of intergovernmental revenues, property taxes and charges for services to fund governmental activities. It also clearly identifies the smaller percentage the Village of Gilberts receives from utility taxes and other revenue sources. Intergovernmental revenues increased due to the State catching up in delayed Local Government Distributive Fund payments and the 1% Non-Home Rule Municipal Service Occupation Tax imposed by the Village.

REVENUES BY SOURCE --- GOVERNMENTAL ACTIVITIES FOR 2016 & 2017


REVENUES BY SOURCE 2016

Public Works

The Public Works Department is committed to maintenance, repair and general upkeep of the streets, buildings, public areas, and parks of the Village of Gilberts. General activities include snow plowing, road maintenance, grass cutting, tree trimming and removal, and providing support for annual community events.

Parks and Recreation

Town Center Park is the Village's newest and largest park. Located at Tyrrell Road and Columbia Lane, Town Center Park has been redeveloped in 2015. New amenities include a playground, splash park, new baseball field, soccer fields, open space for free form activities, and an expanded parking lot with a second and new access to Columbia Lane.

Town Square Park is located off Rt. 72 and Center Drive. This park is the site of the Village's annual Community Days festival and Movies in the Park during the summer months. The park features Lake Gilberts, a gazebo, open space and a playground. This park had a complete electrical system installed during 2014 to support current park activities and to bring new activities to the area.

Memorial Park is located at 355 Tyrrell Road and offers a baseball diamond, soccer field, basketball court, playground, fishing pond, and a picnic pavilion.

Waitcus Park, located on Rt. 72 and Railroad Street, offers a baseball diamond, basketball 1/2 court, playground, and a picnic pavilion.

Interest on Long Term Debt

The Village issues bonds to provide funds for the acquisition and construction of major capital facilities and enters into installment notes to provide funds for the acquisition of capital assets.

Public Safety


The Village of Gilberts Police Department is a full service department engaged in the protection of life and property, prevention of crime, preservation of the public peace, enforcement of laws and ordinances and the enhancement of public safety and promotion of community services.

General Government

The Village Administrator is responsible for implementing the policies and directives of the Village President and Board of Trustees, budget administration, internal controls and strategic planning. The Administrator supervises the Village staff and consultants, leads the development of staff recommendations to the Village President and Board, and supports the Village's various committees and commissions. The Administration Department is the primary source for addressing all citizen and development inquiries and concerns.


Expenditures By Source — Governmental Activities 2016

TAX LEVY


The act of adopting a budget has evolved into a forum for establishing strategic goals and performance expectations. The resulting budget has become the public record of a community dialogue for improving organizational performance and management oversights. Annually the Village adopts a budget that defines its legal spending authority. Departments submit requests to the Village Administrator so that a budget may be prepared. The requested budget document is prepared by fund, function and activity. The budget is presented to the Village Board for review. The Village Board holds a public hearing and adjusts the requested budgeted amounts to reflect anticipated operations and capital spending for the delivery of services offered by the Village.

The Village of Gilberts faces an economic environment similar to many of the other local municipalities. The Village's elected and appointed officials consider many factors when setting the fiscal year budget. These factors include tax rates, fees, the economy, inflation, unemployment rates and the state of the residential housing market. The Village of Gilberts sets a General tax levy and a Pension tax levy, each of which are expressed as a ratio of cents to each \$1000 of assessed value.



The graph below expresses the tax rate on a property with an assessed value of \$200,000. The solid line tracks the tax rate changes from 2004 to 2016. The vertical axis is expressed in increments of \$20 each, and the horizontal axis is expressed on a year by year basis.





Property is assessed by the local assessor, using state of Illinois guidelines, so that values for property tax purposes can be determined. The chief county assessment officer ensures that assessment levels are uniform throughout the county by applying equalization factors to individual township assessments. This ensures that the statutory requirements of a 33 1/3% assessment (of market value) is met. The assessments may then be further equalized at the State level, if necessary.

Taxing districts determine the amount of revenue needed and certify levies to the county clerk. The county clerk calculates the tax rate needed to produce the amount of revenues each taxing district may levy legally according to the assessment value in their district, and applies any state equalization factors if needed.

The county treasurer prepares tax bills, receives payments and distributes taxes to the local government taxing districts that levied them and administers sales of liens on real estate parcels due to nonpayment of taxes.

Animal Control

No dog shall be permitted to be kept in the Village unless properly inoculated for rabies as required by law. No dog shall be permitted to run loose at any place in the Village except on the property of the owner. No person shall permit more than three dogs to be kept in or about any single-family residence or more than two dogs in any single-family unit of any multi-family housing building within the Village.

Block Parties

Any neighborhood may hold a block party, but you must notify the Police Department (**847-428-2954**), Public Works Department (847-428-4167) and the Rutland Dundee Fire Protection District (847-426-2522) to make arrangements to have barricades available on the day of the block party if you intend to block off the street.

Building Permits

You must obtain a building permit for any additions or improvements you make to your home. The building department is located at 73 Industrial Drive. Please call **847-428-4167** for further information. Listed on the Village website www.villageofgilberts.com is information on many requirements you will need for your improvement projects.

Certificate of Occupancy

If you purchased a newly built home, don't forget to obtain your final Certificate of Occupancy if you took possession of your home under a temporary occupancy permit. Call the Building Department at **847-428-4167** for further information.

Curfew

It is unlawful for a person under eighteen years of age to be present at any public assembly, building, street, place, or highway within the Village of Gilberts unless accompanied by a parent or legal guardian on: Friday, Saturday and Sunday after 11:00 p.m. or Monday through Thursday after 10:00 p.m.

Electric Aggregation Program

The Village of Gilberts established a municipal electric aggregation savings program in 2012 following the passage of a voter referendum. The Village sought competitive bids from a number of qualified suppliers, but declined all offers because they could not beat the default Commonwealth Edison price per kWh. The Village may seek bids for a renewal program at a later date if market conditions change.

Garage Sale

You must purchase a permit to have a garage, yard or rummage sale. Permits are \$5 each and are sold at village facilities. Residents are allowed 3 garage sales per year.

Notary Service

Residents can have documents notarized at Village Hall free of charge. Please do not pre-sign a document you want notarized. You must sign your documents in the presence of the notary and provide a photo ID.

Warning sirens are tested in the village every first Tuesday of the month at 10:00am. The siren will sound if there is an imminent weather emergency. If you hear the siren, please go indoors.

Snow Parking Ban

It is unlawful to park a vehicle on any village street following the accumulation of 2 or more inches of falling snow until removed.

Trash Removal

MDC Environmental, Inc. will provide residential garbage pickup services. The service will be billed through the Village every other month. Contact the Village of Gilberts Utility Billing Department at **847-428-4167** to set up an account for trash removal. A trash and recycle tote will be delivered to your home. Refuse, recyclables and yard waste is collected on Thursday for residents south of Rt. 72 (Higgins Rd.) and on Friday for residents north of Rt. 72. When trash removal day falls on a holiday, your trash will be collected the next day. Holidays are New Years Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day. Friday pickups will take place on Saturday for these holiday weeks.
